## Specialty in Developmental Psychology Requirements Checklist

In exceptional circumstances, some flexibility in fulfilling requirements for the Specialty may be possible, with advisor approval and undergraduate program director permission. To begin the process, students should contact their assigned advisor.

Students who complete the Specialty in Developmental Psychology are presented with a certificate recognizing their achievement. To obtain this certificate, submit this completed form to the Psychology Advising Coordinator, Room 312B Math-Psychology prior to the end of the semester in which you plan to graduate.
