PH.D. IN APPLIED DEVELOPMENTAL PSYCHOLOGY

Program Description

The Applied Developmental Psychology Program reflects the intersection of developmental psychology and applied science by considering questions of developmental and societal significance within the context of individuals' everyday lives.

Students in the program will acquire knowledge and skills to conduct research and work to address the well-being of infants, children, adolescents, and emerging adults, particularly within underserved and under-represented groups and across cultural contexts.

Graduates have taken positions teaching and conducting research at universities, analyzing public policy, working in hospital settings, conducting evaluations of and designing interventions for infants, children, adolescents, and their families.

In consultation with their mentor, students develop a program of course work, research and practicum experiences tailored to the demands of their specific career aspirations.

Students in the ADP program can elect to earn an M.A. in ADP en route to earning their Ph.D. in Applied Developmental Psychology.





Faculty Research Foci

Faculty conduct research in four areas with an emphasis on underserved, underrepresented, typically and atypically developing, and intersectional populations.

- Early Development/Early Intervention
- Social Emotional Development
- Learning and Educational Development
- Contexts of Development (e.g., poverty, justice, culture, policy)

Facilities and Special Resources

In addition to the department's laboratories for the study of development, the program draws upon rich research and applied training resources in the Baltimore-Washington corridor. These include: University of Maryland Medical School, Kennedy Krieger Institute, National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, and other federal and state



agencies as well as nonprofit organizations and think tanks.

Program Admission

Admission to the program is based on a review by the admissions committee of:

- The applicant's grade point average, which must be a minimum of 3.00 on a 4.00 scale;
- Performance in relevant courses of study;
- Evaluation by referees;
- Relevant research and practical experience;
- Identification of an area of research interest compatible with the research interests and competence of the program's faculty.
